




'God's calling us to grow': Homewood High grad, Florence pastor, takes Spring Hill Presbyterian pulpit

The Rev. Brandon Miles, a Birmingham native who graduated from Homewood High School and the University of Alabama, has moved from senior pastor at Florence First Presbyterian Church to a new pulpit in Mobile.

He took over as senior pastor of Spring Hill Presbyterian Church on Aug. 1.

Miles, 41, worked in campus ministry at University Presbyterian and Covenant Presbyterian in Tuscaloosa, earned a master's degree in divinity from Austin Presbyterian Seminary and worked as a youth minister and family ministry coordinator at Oakmont Presbyterian Church in Hoover.

He went to First Presbyterian Church in Florence as associate pastor for youth in 2013 and eventually became senior pastor, succeeding the Rev. Richard T. Gillespie IV when he retired.



At Spring Hill, Miles follows the Rev. Searcy Allen "Buz" Wilcoxon IV, who accepted a job in 2022 as chaplain and dean of spiritual life at Presbyterian College in Clinton, S.C. Wilcoxon had been pastor at Spring Hill since 2013. Spring Hill Presbyterian, with weekly attendance of about 175 to 200, is near Spring Hill College and the University of South Alabama. Spring Hill Presbyterian was founded during World War II, in July of 1944. It's got the feel of a neighborhood church, Miles said. "It's beautiful," he said. "There's something reverent. It's all neighborhoods. You don't have too many major roads. There's a reverence and excitement about what it means to be church." Miles and his wife, Sarah, have three children, a girl and twin boys. Miles spent much of his early ministry geared to youth and students.

"A lot of times you hear people say youth are the future of the church," Miles said. "They're part of the church now. The way we communicate our theology and the importance of what it means to be a covenant community together matters now, not in 10 years, or 15 years or 20 years from now."

The Presbyterian Church (USA) has struggled with membership loss for several decades, similar to other mainline Protestant denominations. The PCUSA has declined from 4.25 million members in 1983 to 1.14 million in 2022, and about a third of all members are 71 or older.

The Presbytery of South Alabama, which Spring Hill Presbyterian is part of, is in the process of downsizing its presbytery administrative operation, selling its Daphne office and moving into a smaller space at the Spanish Fort Presbyterian Church. Proceeds from the presbytery sale will go to fund ministry for the presbytery.

That's been a focus of ministry for Miles.

"One of the reasons you've seen a decline in the church throughout America, is because a lot of the youth don't feel a part of the church now," Miles said. "They want to express their faith now. They want to discover God in their lives in a way that isn't the way their grandparents did it 60 years ago."

Churches need to welcome what youth have to say, he said.

"When you focus on youth, you listen," he said. "You explore together. You create a place where people feel welcome to share their beliefs, their hopes, their fears, their hurts. In that, you discover God's grace and God's presence among you."

Christian doctrine can be a hard sell alongside the allure of a materialistic lifestyle.

"The hard thing about ministry, teaching theology and what it means to be part of the church, is recognizing what cultural influences are happening, and not knocking them, but recognizing the difference between that way of living and the way of following God," Miles said.

"And sometimes, how they can come together. One of the hard parts about being Presbyterian is people are looking for certainty. It's really easy to tell someone, 'If you believe this, if you do this, you're going to heaven.' For Presbyterians, it's complex. Theology is not just black and white, it's gray and hard.

"Following Jesus is not an easy thing to do. Each experience, each encounter you have in the world, It gets messy sometimes, different perspectives, different experiences. It's our role as members of the church together to discern that. Sometimes, it's hard and it takes time."

The pastor tries to help find a way.

"In today's world, a lot of people just don't want to give the effort and time that it requires to grow in the way that God's calling us to grow," he said.
